

HEALTHY RESILIENCE IN GRACE

Two are better than one because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other, but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm, but how can one keep warm alone? Ecclesiastes 4:9-10

The fall is starting! There is a lot to be excited about, in particular our growing momentum in worship attendance and stewardship. That's not to mention the imminent arrival of Emily King-Nobles as our new Director of Children, Youth, and Young Adult Ministry! Fall can



bring on stressors as well with the start of school and other activities. We know that stress deeply here in Palo Alto in the tragic loss of another teen a week ago by suicide. I have been reflecting, as you know, on issues of community and I am particularly mindful of the gift that Grace Lutheran Church is for community and what it means for your health, the health of your children and youth, and for the health of the world around us.

Going a handful of times a year to the symphony is glorious! However, you are not going to become proficient in the violin doing that. You need to practice regularly. Distance running for exercise and health is a regular thing as well, not once or twice a year. Learning a new language is another example that requires regular relationship and practice...not simply a single weeklong trip to another country. Likewise, deepening our faith, community, and health is something we do BOTH regularly AND together.

Is your goal to live your life in a way that promotes health and builds resilience the way God created you to live? Your doctor will tell you that building social capital in community will extend your life. If you like digging into the research, look up US Surgeon General Dr Vivek H. Murthy's advisory "Our Epidemic of Loneliness and Isolation." Faith communities like Grace are excellent (and increasingly rare) ways to build this capital. Engagement in Grace Lutheran Church is a way to live a healthier life, a way to build resilience at all ages, and a way to build relational skills and social capital with all kinds of different people over a long period of time. Are we ourselves living and raising our children to be resilient and prepared for healthy community life as they themselves become adults...parents...grandparents...? We seem to do a good job at

raising them to be good at math or soccer, but are we building resilience in them in a way that sets them up to succeed as human beings and thrive in the way God intended? To be successful human beings in addition to competent in their profession? Our local society and community push many priorities, but not all of them lead us to the road of wellness.

If these are your hopes and dreams, I would encourage you to spend your time with your calendar this fall and perhaps remove a few things on it. Make sure that activities that last a school year or athletic season are



not short changing the life long benefits of intergenerational community. Remember that at any point in our lives, we can pivot deeper into relationships, community, and faith in a way that, to reference Ecclesiastes above, keeps us warm together in a world that can be bitter cold at times.

I very much look forward to seeing you soon. Let's do this life together! ❖

THE BALANCING ACT OF BEING HUMAN – AND THE LIFE LONG JOURNEY OF ACCEPTING IT

The carved inscription on our altar bears a verse that has accompanied me my whole life: "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness." This verse was given to me by my parents on the occasion of my baptism—and it is a verse I have wrestled with over and over again. There are so many different ways of reading this verse, ripping it out of context, making it sound condescending, emphasizing just the wrong words. And so, sadly, for a long time, I read it as: For YOU, weakling, grace is sufficient. That's all you deserve.

In an environment that counts on performance and success, grace is not a hard-charging currency. It is, well, just for weaklings. But if we are honest and look at our human condition, imperfect, limited, broken, then we all are weaklings.

For a very long time now, one of my favorite songs has been "After the Storm" by Mumford & Sons. I can listen to it on an endless loop. But it is not only the music that I find soothing. The lyrics use strong images that in turn evoke many memories of my own. But how about you read (and listen—use the QR link to the song) for yourself:

After The Storm

And after the storm, I run and run as the rains come And I look up, I look up, on my knees and out of luck, I look up.

Night has always pushed up day You must know life to see decay But I won't rot, I won't rot Not this mind and not this heart, I won't rot.

And I took you by the hand And we stood tall, And remembered our own land, What we lived for.

And there will come a time, you'll see, with no more tears. And love will not break your heart, but dismiss your fears. Get over your hill and see what you find there, With grace in your heart and flowers in your hair.

And now I cling to what I knew I saw exactly what was true But oh no more.
That's why I hold,
That's why I hold with all I have.
That's why I hold.

And I won't die alone and be left there.

Well I guess I'll just go home,

Oh God knows where.

Because death is just so full and man so small.

Well I'm scared of what's behind and what's before.

And there will come a time, you'll see, with no more tears. And love will not break your heart, but dismiss your fears. Get over your hill and see what you find there, With grace in your heart and flowers in your hair.

The lyrics carry weight. They hold space for grief, for faith, for the quiet courage it takes to keep going. The imagery is strong, and each line seems to unlock a memory, a moment, a reminder of what it means to be human: broken and tired, and at the same time, defiantly hopeful and trying.



And that's where 2 Corinthians 12:9 comes in with a different way of reading it:

"My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness" is a spiritual reorientation, accepting our humanness. When Paul says this, he's pleading for relief—for the removal of a burden. Instead, God offers something more profound: sustaining grace, not by removing the weakness, but by meeting him in it.

That's exactly what "After the Storm" seems to understand. It doesn't promise an escape from the storm—it meets you inside it. That isn't shallow optimism. It's the kind of promise that comes from someone who's been through something and made it out the other side—scarred, maybe, but not destroyed. It echoes Paul's experience of grace not as the absence of pain, but as the presence of love and strength in the midst of it.

This song doesn't rush to fix things. It simply sits with the storm—and gently reminds me that after it, there is still love, still peace, still something worth holding onto. Like God's loving presence in it and through it all. Have faith and courage and get over your hill to see the what you'll find there!

Whatever loop you feel caught in right now, may this song, this verse—and this moment—remind you that you're not alone in it. That your g/Grace community is with you. That God is with you.

CONFIRMATION AT GRACE: BUILDING FAITH AND BUILDING COMMUNITY

Faith is not a one-time decision—it's a lifelong journey. It evolves with our experiences, questions, and challenges. For young people especially, adolescence is a time filled with change: emotional, social, intellectual, and spiritual. That's why this season of life is such a meaningful moment to intentionally explore what faith looks like—and to do it within a supportive community.

At Grace, our Confirmation Program is designed to walk alongside middle schoolers (grades 6–8) as they ask real questions, face big emotions, and begin to think more deeply about what it means to be a person of faith in the world today.

But Confirmation at Grace is more than just learning about beliefs—it's about building relationships, learning to live in community, and discovering how shared values can anchor us in the storms of life.

Why Community Matters

In a world where young people are constantly navigating social pressures, technology, and identity questions, a strong, values-based community provides something rare: belonging without judgment. Our Confirmation Program gives students a safe space to bring their whole selves—questions, doubts, joys, and struggles—and be met with openness and care.

Through regular gatherings, mentorship, worship participation, and shared experiences like retreats and camps, students learn what it means to be part of something larger than themselves. They see firsthand how faith is not just a personal belief, but something that is lived out in relationship with others.

And here's the beautiful truth: when kids feel grounded in community, they build resilience. They're more likely to feel confident, supported, and capable of navigating life's challenges—because they know they don't have to do it alone.

What the Program Includes

Confirmation Classes take place weekly on Wednesdays, with two flexible options to fit your family's schedule:

- 4:30-5:30 PM (Zoom)
- 7:00-8:00 PM (In-person)

Sessions are interactive and creative, connecting students' life experiences with Lutheran Christian teachings. We don't just lecture—we talk, reflect, laugh, and explore together.

Additional program elements include:

- Mentor Program & Sunday School Monthly meetups with an adult mentor during Sunday School in Brown Hall, beginning on Rally Day.
- Acolyting Students take part in worship by serving as acolytes. Training begins shortly after Rally Day.
- Worship Notes Tools to help students stay engaged and reflect during worship services.
- Retreats & Off-Site Activities Including the SPSYC Middle School Retreat (Nov. 14-16, 2025), where students deepen connections and enjoy time away in nature.

WE GATHER TOGETHER

Some years ago, a task force at Grace created, and the congregation approved, a set of Guiding Principles to provide a framework for the life and work of this Christian community. It's possible that you don't know about them, or maybe have forgotten— I had forgotten about them myself until I saw them printed at the back of this year's Annual Report! It's an outstanding document, and I find myself particularly drawn to these words about worship:

Grace Lutheran Church is called to be, first and foremost, engaged in Christ-centered worship. Worship is the common experience in our community that leads us toward lives of grace. Our sacramental and liturgical worship engages all of our senses and embodies the best of our tradition.

And what do we do when we worship? We gather together in one place, we hear the words of scripture, we pray, we receive the sacraments, and we adorn it all with music, particularly YOUR music, the united voice of the assembly. When we gather for worship every Sunday morning, every person in the room has something to contribute, whether large or small, to the combined voice of the community. When we sing hymns and other parts of the service together, we become an audible and visible sign of the Body of Christ. And there is no need to worry whether your voice is any good! The German theologian and martyr Dietrich Bonhoeffer once wrote: "It is the voice of the Church that is heard in singing together. It is not I who sings, it is the Church that is singing, and I, as a member of the Church, may share in its song."

Of course, we have ensembles who provide leadership and enhancement of the Church's song, and as usual at this time of year, it is time for them to reconvene after a muchdeserved summer break!

Our **Chancel Choir**, or the "adult choir," is open to any singer of high school age and up. We will begin weekly rehearsals on Wednesday, September 3 from 7:00-8:30 pm,

and will sing at the 10:45 service most Sundays beginning September 7. The choir sings a wide variety of music, accompanied

and a cappella. We welcome singers of any experience level, from beginners to the most experienced. All voice parts are invited, but we'd love the balance of a few more tenors and basses! No audition is required.

Are you interested in singing but not quite ready to take the full plunge? Contact me (tim@gracepa.org) and let's work out a deal! Perhaps an every-other-week schedule might work for you. Or maybe you'd like to start with only a short-term commitment. You could join now and sing just the fall Sundays. Or join in November for Advent and Christmas. Our year falls fairly naturally into blocks of about two months' length.

Praises Ring is the name of Grace's **handbell ensemble**. We rehearse on Thursday afternoons from 5:00-6:00 pm and will begin on September 11. The bells usually ring in church on the first Sunday of each month, plus Christmas Eve. We own a full five-octave (61 note) set of handbells, and ideally need 13 people to make use of the full set. We have a couple of spots open this year, so do let me know if you're interested. No prior experience with bell ringing is necessary, although some basic music-reading ability is helpful. We'll teach you all the rest!

A short-term **Children's Choir** project will meet for just six weeks this fall, learning a song or two during the Sunday School opening time and singing at the beginning of the 10:45 service on October 19. Parents: plan now to bring your children as many Sundays as possible to help make this a successful experience!

Beer and Hymns in July was a fun-filled experience of community and music-making, with over 50 people gathering at church on a Friday evening to sing together in a relaxed environment with food and a beverage. Make plans to join us for the second edition on Friday, October 17 at 5:30!!

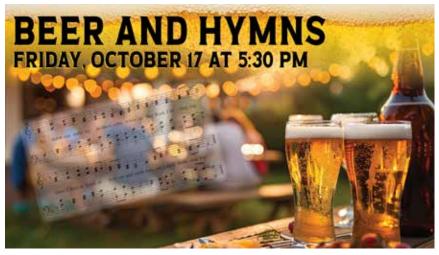

Come reconnect, grow deeper, and celebrate all that God is doing in our midst. We can't wait to see you there!





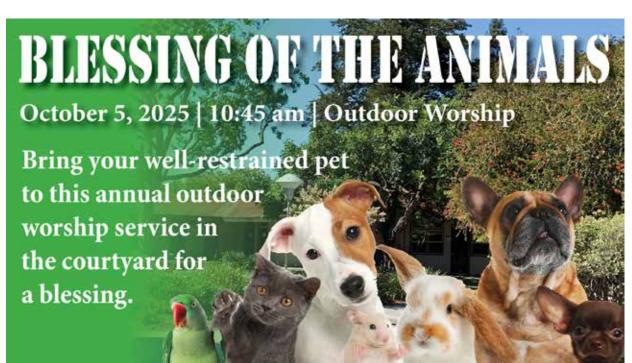
